The December Monthly Contribution Reports (MCR) are posted on the Member Access area of the RI Website. Please review your District reports with your District Rotary Foundation Committee and District Leadership Team. Also, encourage your Club Presidents to review their Club Recognition Summary (CRS). This will give them a good understanding of the contributions that have been made to date. The reports should also be reviewed for accuracy. Reminder: We have 90 days from the date of a gift to modify (reclassify) any gifts (i.e. change from Annual Programs Fund to PolioPlus, etc.).

- Are your District contributions at the level with which you are content at this point in the Rotary year?
- Have you made personal phone calls to all zero giving or low-giving Clubs?
- Is your District Rotary Foundation Club active? Meeting regularly? Reporting on activities?
- Are your Clubs actively engaged in International Service projects and the programs of TRF?
- Are all Rotarians in your District being ASKED to contribute to OUR Rotary Foundation?

Zone 27 (still) Leads the World in Giving to the Permanent Fund (through December)

Zone 27 continues to lead the world in giving to the Permanent Fund of OUR Rotary Foundation. Thank you for all of your efforts in increasing the awareness of the Permanent Fund with your District Rotarians. A gift to the Permanent Fund allows our donors to have their gift live forever. When discussing a gift, please remind your donors that they can dedicate their gift to the “SHARE” program, allowing one-half of the annual earnings to be returned to your District Designated Fund (DDF) to be used on an ongoing basis to support your District projects and TRF programs.

\$2,831,658 in Total Giving to The Rotary Foundation (through December)

Zone 27 Rotarians have contributed \$2,831,658 (an increase in “total giving” over the same time period in 2007) which places our Zone 7th in total giving to The Rotary Foundation (including Annual Giving, Permanent Fund Gifts, \$100 Million Challenge and Restricted Giving). [These contribution totals don’t add up with those shown in the chart above as the PolioPlus contributions reflect all gifts through January 31 while the other fund totals are through December 31.] Thank you all for ***Making Dreams Real*** for millions of our world neighbors. Rotary’s \$100 Million Challenge is now Rotary’s \$200 Million Challenge

The DGE had the privilege of hearing Bill Gates make the announcement that the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation is re-affirming their belief in and support of Rotary International’s commitment to eradicate the wild polio virus from the face of the earth with their additional challenge grant of \$255 Million. What does this mean to your District Clubs and their efforts in support of eradicating polio?

- a. All Clubs are asked to increase their annual commitment of our efforts to \$2,000/year through 2012.
- b. Continue Club efforts to fundraise on behalf of polio eradication through community awareness activities.
- c. Cultivate major gifts from individual Rotarians whose passion includes polio eradication.



END POLIO NOW Frequently Asked Questions

- Q** *What is the approximate dollar amount spend on the global polio eradication effort each year?*
- A** In 2008 and 2009, about US\$700 million per year is needed in donor contributions to fund the final eradication phase. This level of expense is expected to decrease as wild polio virus transmission is interrupted in the four remaining polio endemic countries and outbreaks in previously polio free countries are reduced in number. By the time that transmission is interrupted in all countries, Rotary will have contributed over US\$1 billion to a program which is expected to total approximately US \$10 billion in donor funds.
- Q** *How is the budget for the Global Polio Eradication Initiative prepared?*
- A** The budget for the Global Polio Eradication Initiative is prepared by the WHO and UNICEF in consultation with their country offices and ministries of health. It is reviewed and revised semi-annually to reflect changing epidemiology as well as new contributions and financial commitments made by donors to the program, including donor countries. As one of the spearheading partners for the Global Polio Eradication Initiative, Rotary is advised

about the process but does not play an active role in developing the budget. Information about the global polio eradication budget is available to the public in the website www.polioeradication.org/fundingbackground.asp#FRR.

Q *What part does Rotary play in raising funds for Polio Eradication?*

A Rotary International's contribution to the Global Polio Eradication Initiative since 1988 accounts for nearly 12% of all contributions to the Global budget and represents approximately 66% of private sector contributions to the Initiative. In addition, Rotary plays a leading role in soliciting financial support from donor nation governments, an effort which since 1988 has achieved more than US\$6 billion in contributions.

Q *What do these funds pay for?*

A In the initial stages of PolioPlus, Rotary paid for oral polio vaccine and supported start-up costs for Rotarians' social mobilization efforts in endemic countries. Since the mid-1990's Rotary has conferred continuously with its spearheading partners (WHO, UNICEF and CDC) to determine how to deploy PolioPlus funds to achieve the greatest impact on global program needs. Currently, Rotary is funding needs in the following areas: salaries for technical advisors, surveillance, social mobilization and stipends for the millions of volunteers who conduct National Immunization Days (NIDs) and perform house-to-house follow up visits.

Q *Is this the last time we are going to ask Rotarians for money?*

A Hopefully, yes; however, global polio eradication is our organization's #1 priority. Rotary has given its word to achieve the goal of polio eradication and that goal has not yet been achieved.

Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation Challenge Grant

“This is an historic moment in Rotary’s history. The partnership with the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation has reached a new level to provide a significant portion of the funding necessary to make the dream of a polio-free world real.” (The Rotary Foundation, January 2009) Bill Gates, Co-Chair of the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation said, **“The extraordinary dedication of Rotary members has played a critical role in bringing polio to the brink of eradication. Eradicating polio will be one of the most significant public health accomplishments in history, and we are committed to helping reach that goal.”**

Q *What are the terms of the grants?*

A The Gates Foundation has awarded The Rotary Foundation a total of \$355 million in two challenge grants to help end polio. In response, Rotary has committed to raising a total of \$200 million by June 30, 2012. The effort is called Rotary's \$200 Million Challenge.

The Gates Foundation grants represent a tremendous validation of the approach and success of our PolioPlus program. The RI Board of Directors and The Rotary Foundation Trustees have unanimously agreed to accept these challenge grants at a critical juncture for the Global Polio Eradication Initiative, which needs adequate funding to reach the eradication goal. Funds from the grants will be distributed by The Rotary Foundation to the most critical polio-affected countries through grants to the World Health Organization and UNICEF in direct support of polio immunization activities.

Q *Is progress being made in polio eradication?*

A Since Rotary launched the PolioPlus program, the number of polio cases has decreased by more than 99% and the number of polio-endemic countries has fallen from 125 to 4. In the four polio-endemic countries (Afghanistan, India, Nigeria, Pakistan), wild poliovirus circulates in very limited geographic areas.

Rotary’s \$200 M Challenge: What are Rotary Clubs and Rotarians Being Asked to Do?

Rotary Club and Rotarian participation in Rotary's \$200 Million Challenge is critical to making it a success. Rotary raised over \$57 million toward our goal in 2008 alone. Since the \$100 Million Challenge began in November of 2007, our total contributions exceed \$75million. **Each Club is being challenged to organize a public fundraising event to raise a minimum of \$2,000 annually for the next three years. Individual Rotarians are also invited to personally take part in Rotary's challenge, with special emphasis on new Clubs and members who have not yet had the opportunity to participate in Rotary's priority program.**



DVD of Bill Gates Presentation at the International Assembly

All District Governors-elect received a copy of Bill Gates' speech presented at the International Assembly.

I would encourage you to share this presentation at your District Leadership Training, PETS and District Assembly. Bill Gates is not just writing a check to OUR Foundation. He is as passionate about the eradication of polio as we are. He is entrenched with us. He will inspire your District leadership as much as he inspired you in San Diego.



FUTURE VISION PLAN

Pilot District Partnerships with Non-Pilot Districts (effective 2010-11)

Both the pilot and non-pilot districts will be eligible to participate in the PolioPlus and Rotary Centers for International Studies programs.

Future Vision Plan of The Rotary Foundation UPDATE

1. I am pleased to report that the overwhelming majority of the Districts in Zone 27 intend to make application to serve as a “Pilot District” for the Future Vision Plan. The application is available on-line via Member Access on the RI Website at www.rotary.org. The sitting DG, DGE and DGN must be involved in the process as well as all applications must certify that 2/3 of the Clubs in your District have endorsed the District’s application to participate as a Pilot District. There are no requirements as to how and when the clubs are canvassed and the 2/3 approval is obtained. We have heard that some districts are canvassing by email, which is perfectly acceptable. Districts may also wish to take advantage of their District Conference, PETS, or their District Assembly if possible. It is up to the district to decide who can be the voice of the club as well. The simple act of submitting the Future Vision application will be the district's confirmation that it has secured the support of at least 2/3 of its clubs to apply to be a pilot district. No supporting documentation regarding the club approval is required.
2. I hope that the above table, provided by The Rotary Foundation Future Vision Plan staff, is helpful to you. It is a very detailed and informative listing of program participation by both (selected) Pilot Districts and non-Pilot Districts. Please share this information with your Clubs as you present them with the opportunity to participate as a Pilot District. The more information that we can provide to our Clubs, the more excited they will be about the Future Vision Plan and their involvement in the direction of OUR Rotary Foundation as we move toward our second century of service to humanity.
3. By February 20, a PowerPoint presentation that will be appropriate to the Clubs will be available on the RI Website. Please check the Website on a regular basis so that you can incorporate this presentation in planning your PETS agenda topic for the Future Vision Plan.
4. Please ask your Clubs to look at participation in the Pilot District program of the Future Vision Plan as an opportunity. Those Districts chosen as Pilot Districts will be setting the course for OUR FUTURE. We are moving forward and the Pilot Districts will be playing a key role as the face of OUR Rotary Foundation for years to come. Be a part of the new direction of The Rotary Foundation.

TRF Recognition Points

Beginning July 1, 2009, The Rotary Foundation will only transfer recognition points in increments of 500 points or more...with one exception. **If the transfer is accompanied by a cash contribution, the point transfer amount can be in any amount.** For example, if your Club is currently matching member contributions of \$100, and the transfer is made with the member’s gift of \$100, the transfer of 100 recognition points can be made.

Polio Eradication Speakers

Polio survivors are living in all of our Districts. Please create a speakers bureau that includes polio survivors. Who better to tell the story than those who have survived this dreaded disease? Members in our Districts have participated in **National Immunization Day events (NID)**. They have seen the ravages of the disease first hand. Include them in communications to your Clubs so they can invite them to speak at Club meetings and special events.

TRF-Direct

The Rotary Foundation has updated **TRF-Direct to include gifts to the Annual Programs Fund and PolioPlus.**

PolioPlus “POP-UP” Boxes

The PolioPlus **POP-UP Boxes have been updated to serve as banks for loose change.** They are available through the RI Warehouse as catalogue #989 and are available for \$3.00/each.

Remaining DDF

All District Governors and District Rotary Foundation Chairs will be receiving a letter from TRF regarding non-allocated DDF. Please **consider donating any excess DDF to (1) PolioPlus, (2) World Peace Fellows, and/or (3) Low-Income Country Scholarships.**

Paul Harris Fellow Certificates

Beginning July 1 2009, all first-time **Paul Harris Fellow Certificates will include the “End Polio Now” logo graphic.** The graphic will appear on the certificates regardless of the designation of the gift.

Club Goal Forms

The new Club Goal Forms arrived in every District upon the DGE return from the International Assembly. **The updated forms include Club goals for the Annual Programs Fund (Every Rotarian Every Year), Rotary’s \$200 Million Challenge and the Permanent Fund.** It is so important that all of our Clubs complete the forms with aggressive and achievable goals. Prepare your Assistant Governors and TRF Middle Managers to provide assistance to your Clubs as they complete the forms.

Rotary International 2009-2010

It is important for all Clubs in your District to review and implement the Strategic Plan, as approved by the RI Board of Directors in 2007, in their plans for the 2009-2010 Rotary year. In his theme goals for 2009-2010, President-elect John Kenny says, "We see ourselves as part of a great Rotary tradition, as links in a chain joining our future to our past. If that chain is to continue, every link in it must be strong. It is our responsibility, yours and mine, to forge solid links to Rotary's future. It is our responsibility to ensure that Rotary will be stronger next year than it is now, and even stronger the year after that...As Mohandas Gandhi once told us, 'The future depends on what we do in the present.' If we hope to see Rotary continue through a second century of service, we cannot simply leave well enough alone. If the road ahead is to be long, then we will need a map to travel it-and we have that map [in our Strategic Plan]."
